### Military in the Essex County Parks Brochure

## **Eagle Rock History Lesson for Scouts**



# **Experiments at Eagle Rock:** New Information Discovered

While researching the history of the Parks' connections with the military through the Essex County Parks Archives, an enlightening discovery was uncovered suggesting that Thomas Edison was not the only scientist conducting government tests at Eagle Rock Reservation during World War I. In the Park Commission's minutes (see excerpt below), it is noted that permission was given to the renowned and accomplished optical physicist Perley G. Nutting, who was then working for Westinghouse Electric as director of research. Nutting was also the founder of the Optical Society of America and would have brought great expertise to these experiments for the government in association with the First World War.
