

## **Preliminary Commission is Named**



On June 18, 1894, as set forth in the enabling legislation, Judge David A. Depue named the five commissioners of the preliminary park commission. He wanted to select people "so favorable to this enterprise and so desirous that it should be executed" that they would be judicious and make sound recommendations. Otherwise, a park system might never come to fruition. His selections

were, from the Boards of Trade committees on public parks, Frederick W. Kelsey of Orange and Cyrus Peck and Stephen J. Meeker of Newark. Feeling the need to have representation from the county at large, the judge chose his friend Edward Jackson from Belleville and George W. Bramhall from South Orange.

The Daily Advertiser in an editorial that day expressed confidence that "these men will do their work faithfully and well." The formal announcement, made a few days later, after the men had accepted, stated they were to be known as the Essex County Park Commission. After accepting the post, they met for the first time on June 23 and took up the work with interest and enthusiasm.

Commissioner Kelsey, a nurseryman, went on to write about the commission in, The First County Park System in 1905. Further, he set aside funds in his will to go toward the Essex County Park System in the form of the "Kelsey Park Fund". At the Essex County South Mountain Reservation, George W. Bramhall's legacy lives on through Bramhall Terrace. Erected in 1926, a plaque at the site reads: "A tribute to his successful efforts to

secure the lands comprised in South Mountain Reservation for the healthful recreation of the people of Essex County."
